Gladys Mungo, founder of Haiti's Children Inc., is the guest speaker. She will also speak at

Gladys has lived in Haiti since 2008. Haiti's Children is a 501(c)(3) recognized public charity and provides primary and secondary education, vocational training, and food programs to needy children in Haiti. This support, along with medical clinics and agricultural and environmental education, is designed to move poverty-stricken Haitians towards self-sufficiency.

A key goal is to give children the chance to receive Jesus Christ as their personal Lord and Savior to reassure the chil-

dren of Haiti that God has not forgotten them. "God loves them, always has, always will."

In 2002, Gladys began working in Haiti organizing, raising funds and staffing ongoing mission teams. Food, medical treatment and education were provided for an impoverished and remote village, Basin Caiman, on Haiti's southern coast. Gladys still leads mission teams in Haiti who teach and work alongside our Haitian brothers and sisters.

## PASTOR JON'S COLUMN — Passin' it On!!! — "Seating for the Spiritually Handicapped!"

Well, well, well ... Are you one who uses the advent of a new year to make resolutions? Perhaps you don't make

resolutions but still use that time of year to think about what you would like to change about yourself – what you believe needs to be different in your life. If you are, how is that working for you?

I have a few personal thoughts about this resolu-

tion thing – this desire to change, or have changed for us – that which we think needs to be different.

First, is the usually faulty premise that I have: that when I make those resolutions, I actually know what I need. I have to ask myself, "How often do I really know what I need?" For that matter, when do any of us really "know" what we need? I mean look at the guy in the second chapter of Mark. His buddies carry him on a mat to seek healing from Jesus. The guy can't walk -Gotta assume that what he wants (his resolution) is to walk again. But Jesus knows what he needs first. "Son. your sins are forgiven." SO I guess I am not alone in not always "knowing" what I need.

Second, is that my resolutions typically give me a great sense of control, and seem to be mostly about me taking control of my life, my world - myself! Not much room for my God in that equation. When my resolution succeeds, I get a false sense that I am in control – until the next crisis, trouble, or bump in the road! Then I re-

sort back to what I have always done

– EXCEPT to do it better, harder,
longer, with more passion! Look at
me go!

Then I usually end up by the wayside, like the guy in the fifth chapter of John who has been lying outside the pool of healing waters for 38 years waiting to get to the pool at the right time and maybe be healed. We don't know exactly why he hasn't been able to get into the pool and possibly be healed of his

infirmities. Maybe he didn't exactly know what he needed. Maybe the problem was that he thought he knew exactly what he needed, <u>AND</u> how it should be provided, <u>AND</u> how <u>HE</u> was going to do it. Or maybe, he felt sorry for himself, or was ashamed, or was afraid – afraid to be changed even though it was needed.

We do get some insight into him as Jesus approaches this man who lay in his own pile of self-pity and victimization. I am betting he probably made plenty of resolutions – each outlining exactly what he thought he needed and exactly how he was going to make it happen. After 38 years he wasn't really any further along than when he started. Then Jesus approaches and cuts to the heart of the matter for this man, for me...and for you – looks past the outside of this man right into his very soul. The starting point of the only resolution we need to respond to. Jesus asks the man. "Do you want to get well?"

The man responds with what I loosely read as a litany of previous resolutions and self-attempts that haven't worked. Apparently this man never thought to call on the power of the One who can transform, heal, and change him from within. Apparently this man could see his outward handicap but was oblivious to his inward. spiritual handicap as well. Now there is a guy in the Bible I can relate to! With a single question from Jesus, "Do you want to get well?" Jesus cuts through all the self-generated resolutions (the "I know what I need better than anyone or anything else" needs) of our lives and brings us to the only need we always really have in our lives - "Do I want to get well?"

Then secondly, Jesus' question assumes that we cannot do it by ourselves, cannot resolve our "spiritual handicap" on our own. OUCH! What about me? What about my control? Jesus passes by us and asks again and again, sees us parked in our own personal "Spiritual Handicapped" parking spaces of life and asks, "Do you want to get well?"

What does this have to do with anything? - you might be asking (If I haven't lost you by now). Well, maybe not much, except that as you go through your day, your week, another year – as you reflect on what you think you need, what needs to change (it's you by the way) or where to start - let us be reminded that we are all handicapped children of God, really needing nothing more than to get well; that our spiritual handicaps can be transformed, changed, and embolden by the one who comes to ask us, "Do you want to get well?" - Jesus himself. The man brought by his friends on the mat came to know this.

In this small town of New Auburn, already made popular by Michael Perry's folksy book, *Population 485*, McKinze has proven winning isn't everything; that kindness and sharing count as well.




